**WARNING:** TO REDUCE THE RISK OF FIRE OR ELECTRIC SHOCK, DONOT EXPOSE THIS PRODUCT TO RAIN OR MOISTURE.

Power Supply: This Projector is designed to operate on 100 V - 240 V, 50 Hz/60 Hz AC, house current only.

**CAUTION:** The AC power cord which is supplied with the projector as an accessory can only be used for power supplies up to 125 V. If you need to use higher voltages than this, you will need to obtain a separate 250 V power cord. If you use the accessory cord in such situations, fire may result.







#### WARNING:

#### POWER

### The wall outlet or the circuit breaker shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible when problems occur. If the following problems occur, cut off the power supply immediately.

Continued use of the projector in these conditions will result in fire or electric shock.

- If foreign objects or water get inside the projector, cut off the power supply.
- If the projector is dropped or the cabinet is broken, cut off the power supply.
- If you notice smoke, strange smells or noise coming from the projector, cut off the power supply.
- Please contact an Authorized Service Center for repairs, and do not attempt to repair the projector yourself.

#### During a thunderstorm, do not touch the projector or the cable.

Electric shocks can result.

#### Do not do anything that might damage the power cord or the power plug.

If the power cord is used while damaged, electric shocks, short-circuits or fire will result.

• Do not damage the power cord, make any modifications to it, place it near any hot objects, bend it excessively, twist it, pull it, place heavy objects on top of it or wrap it into a bundle.

Ask an Authorized Service Center to carry out any repairs to the power cord that might be necessary.

#### Completely insert the power plug into the wall outlet and the power connector into the projector terminal.

- If the plug is not inserted correctly, electric shocks or overheating will result.
- Do not use plugs which are damaged or wall outlets which are coming loose from the wall.

#### Do not use anything other than the provided power cord.

Failure to observe this will result in fire or electric shocks. Please note that if you do not use the provided power cord to ground the device on the side of the outlet, this may result in electric shocks.

#### Clean the power plug regularly to prevent it from becoming covered in dust.

Failure to observe this will cause a fire.

- If dust builds up on the power plug, the resulting humidity can damage the insulation.
- If not using the projector for an extended period of time, pull the power plug out from the wall outlet.

Pull the power plug out from the wall outlet and wipe it with a dry cloth regularly.

#### Do not handle the power plug and power connector with wet hands.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks.

#### Do not overload the wall outlet.

If the power supply is overloaded (ex., by using too many adapters), overheating may occur and fire will result.

#### ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place the projector on soft materials such as carpets or sponge mats.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause burns, fire or damage to the projector.

### Do not set up the projector in humid or dusty places or in places where the projector may come into contact with oily smoke or steam, ex. a bathroom.

Using the projector under such conditions will result in fire, electric shocks or deterioration of components. Deterioration of components (such as ceiling mount brackets) may cause the projector which is mounted on the ceiling to fall down.

### Do not install this projector in a place which is not strong enough to take the full weight of the projector or on top of a surface which is sloped or unstable.

Failure to observe this will cause projector to fall down or tip over the projector, and severe injury or damage could result.

#### WARNING:

#### Do not cover the air intake/exhaust ports or place anything within 500 mm (20") of them.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause fire or damage to the projector.

- Do not place the projector in narrow, badly ventilated places.
- Do not place the projector on cloth or papers, as these materials could be drawn into the air intake port.

#### Do not look at the light emitted from the lens while the projector is being used.

Doing so can cause loss of sight.

• Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens. Do not directly look at this light.

#### Do not expose your eyes and skin to the projection light while the projector is being used.

- Possibly hazardous optical radiation is emitted from this product, causing damage to your eyes and skin.
- Be especially careful not to let young children look into the lens. In addition, turn off the power and disconnect the power plug when you are away from the projector.

#### Never attempt to remodel or disassemble the projector.

High voltages can cause fire or electric shocks.

• For any inspection, adjustment and repair work, please contact an Authorized Service Center. Doing so may cause exposure to dangerous laser radiation.

• The laser module is built in this projector. Follow procedures specified in the Operating Instructions to make operations and adjustments.

### Do not allow metal objects, flammable objects, or liquids to enter inside of the projector. Do not allow the projector to get wet.

Doing so may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in fire, electric shock, or malfunction of the projector.

- Do not place containers of liquid or metal objects near the projector.
- If liquid enters inside of the projector, consult your dealer.
- Particular attention must be paid to children.

#### Use the ceiling mount bracket specified by Panasonic.

- Using the ceiling mount bracket other than the specified one will result in falling accidents.
- Attach the supplied safety cable to the ceiling mount bracket to prevent the projector from falling down.

#### **Installation work (such as ceiling mount bracket) should only be carried out by a qualified technician.** If installation is not carried out and secured correctly, it can cause injury or accidents, such as electric shocks.

Be sure to use the wire provided with the ceiling mount bracket as an extra safety measure to prevent the
projector from falling down. (Install in a different location to the ceiling mount bracket.)

#### WARNING:

#### ACCESSORIES

#### Do not use or handle the batteries improperly, and refer to the following.

Failure to observe this will cause burns, batteries to leak, overheat, explode or catch fire.

- Use AA/R6/LR6 batteries.
- Do not use unspecified batteries.
- Do not use chargeable batteries.
- Do not disassemble dry cell batteries.
- Do not heat the batteries or place them into water or fire.
- Do not allow the + and terminals of the batteries to come into contact with metallic objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not store or carry batteries together with metallic objects.
- Store the batteries in a plastic bag and keep them away from metallic objects.
- Make sure the polarities (+ and –) are correct when inserting the batteries.
- Do not use a new battery together with an old battery or mix different types of batteries.

• Leaving them in the unit may result in fluid leakage, overheating, or explosion of the batteries.

#### When disconnecting the power cord, be sure to hold the power plug and power connector.

If the power cord itself is pulled, the lead will become damaged, and fire, short-circuits or serious electric shocks will result.

### When not using the projector for an extended period of time, disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet.

Failure to do so may result in fire or electric shock.

#### **Disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet before carrying out any cleaning.** Failure to do so may result in electric shock.

#### ■ ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

#### Do not put your weight on this projector.

You could fall or the projector could break, and injury will result.

• Be especially careful not to let young children stand or sit on the projector.

#### Do not place the projector in extremely hot locations.

Doing so will cause the outer casing or internal components to deteriorate, or result in fire.

• Take particular care in locations exposed to direct sunlight or near stoves.

#### Do not place your hands or other objects close to the air exhaust port.

Doing so will cause burns or damage your hands or other objects.

• Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port. Do not place your hands or face, or objects which cannot withstand heat close to this port.

#### Always disconnect all cables before moving the projector.

Moving the projector with cables still attached can damage the cables, which will cause fire or electric shocks to occur.

### When mounting the projector on the ceiling, keep mounting screws and power cord from contact with metal parts inside the ceiling.

Contact with metal parts inside the ceiling can cause electric shocks.

#### ACCESSORIES

### Ask your dealer about cleaning inside the projector every 20 000 hours of usage as an estimated duration.

Continuous use while dust is accumulated inside the projector may result in fire.

• For cleaning fee, ask your dealer.

### When not using the projector for an extended period of time, remove the batteries from the remote control.

Failure to observe this will cause the batteries to leak, overheat, catch fire or explode, which may result in fire or contamination of surrounding area.

#### CAUTION:

#### VIEWING 3D VIDEO

Those with a medical history of oversensitivity to light, heart problems, or poor physical health should not view 3D images.

This may lead to a worsening of medical conditions.

If you feel tiredness or discomfort, or other abnormality while viewing with 3D Eyewear, discontinue viewing.

Continuing use may cause health problems. Take a break as necessary.

When viewing 3D movies, aim to view one movie at a time and take a break as necessary.

When viewing 3D images, for example when playing 3D games or using a PC where two way interaction is possible, take an appropriate break every 30 to 60 minutes.

Watching for long periods of time may cause eye fatigue.

When preparing contents, use contents properly created to be used for 3D. This may cause eye fatigue or health problems.

When viewing 3D images, pay attention to people and objects in the vicinity.

3D video may be mistaken for actual objects, and the related bodily movements can cause damage to objects and lead to injury.

Use 3D Eyewear when viewing 3D videos.

Do not tilt your head when viewing with 3D Eyewear.

Those who are near or far sighted, those with weaker eyesight in one eye, or those with astigmatism should use corrective glasses etc. when using 3D Eyewear.

If the image appears distinctly double when viewing 3D video, discontinue viewing.

Watching for long periods of time may cause eye fatigue.

View at a distance of at least three times the effective height of the screen.

Viewing at distance closer than the recommended distance may cause eye fatigue. As with movies, if there are black bands at the top and bottom of the video, view at a distance of 3 times or more of the height of the video section.

Children younger than 5 or 6 years old should not use 3D Eyewear.

As it is difficult to gauge the reactions of children to fatigue and discomfort their condition may worsen suddenly. If a child uses the 3D Eyewear, guardians should beware of the child's eyes becoming tired.



Após o uso, as pilhas e/ou baterias deverão ser entregues ao estabelecimento comercial ou rede de assistência técnica autorizada.

Cobrir os terminais positivo (+) e negativo (-) com uma fita isolante adesiva, antes de depositar numa caixa destinada para o recolhimento. O contato entre partes metálicas pode causar vazamentos, gerar calor, romper a blindagem e produzir fogo. (Fig. 1)

Fig. 1 Como isolar os terminais




Não desmonte, não remova o invólucro, nem amasse a bateria. O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais. Não incinere nem aqueça as baterias, elas não podem ficar expostas a temperaturas superiores a 100 °C (212 °F). O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais.



### Features of the Projector

## Easy setup and improved serviceability

In addition to the 2x zoom lens and wide lens shift, the portrait setting is supported. Also, a highly flexible setup is achieved through DIGITAL LINK ( page 18) support.

#### Long-life reliability achieved

The reliability is enhanced through the power-driving and unique cooling control system that maximizes the life of the light source, and complete hermeticity of the light source unit, achieving the maintenance-free projector for a long time.

## Energy conservation achieved through the ECO function

The function to reduce power consumption is installed, which is optimizing the light source power according to the brightness of the surroundings, input signal, and video mute status.

#### Improved system performance

A wide range of uses are available, with the installation of the edge blending function and multiple-projector brightness control function, as well as the support for 3D projection (VESA standard IR system, DLP Link system). **Quick Steps**

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# Chapter 1 **Preparation**

This chapter describes things you need to know or check before using the projector.

### **Precautions for use**

#### Cautions when transporting

- When transporting the projector, hold it securely by its bottom and avoid excessive vibration and impacts. They may damage the internal components and result in malfunctions.
- Do not transport the projector with the adjustable feet extended. Doing so may damage the adjustable feet.

#### Cautions when installing

#### Do not set up the projector outdoors.

The projector is designed for indoor use only.

#### Do not set up the projector in the following locations.

- Places where vibration and impacts occur such as in a car or vehicle: Doing so may cause damage to internal components or malfunction.
- Near the exhaust of an air conditioner: Depending on the conditions of use, the screen may fluctuate in rare cases due to the hot air from the air exhaust port or the heated or cooled air. Make sure that the exhaust from the projector or other equipment, or the air from the air conditioner does not blow toward the front of the projector.
- Near lights (studio lamps, etc.) and other locations with severe temperature fluctuations (when using at a place lower than 1 400 m (4 593') above sea level: operating temperature of 0 °C (32 °F) to 45 °C (113 °F), when using at a place of 1 400 m (4 593') to 2 700 m (8 858') above sea level: operating temperature of 0 °C (32 °F) to 40 °C (104 °F)): The outer case may be deformed by heat, which may result in malfunctions.
- Near high-voltage power lines or near motors: Doing so may interfere with the operation of the projector.
- Place where there is high-power laser equipment: Directing a laser beam onto the lens surface causes damage to the DLP chips.

#### Be sure to ask a specialized technician or your dealer when installing the projector to a ceiling.

The optional ceiling mount bracket is required. Model No.: ET-PKR100H (for high ceilings), ET-PKR100S (for low ceilings), ET-PKR100P (for portrait)

### Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring for DIGITAL LINK connection.

Image and sound may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.

#### The projector may not work properly due to strong radio wave from the broadcast station or the radio.

If there is any facility or equipment, which outputs strong radio wave, near the installation location, install the projector at a location sufficiently far from the source of the radio wave. Or, wrap the LAN cable connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal by using a piece of metal foil or a metal pipe, of which is grounded at both ends.

#### Lens focus

The high clarity projection lens is thermally affected by the light from the light source, making the focus unstable in the period just after switching on the power. Wait at least 30 minutes with the image projected before adjusting the lens focus.

#### Make sure to set [HIGH ALTITUDE MODE] to [ON] when using the projector at elevations between 1 400 m (4 593') and 2 700 m (8 858') above sea level.

Failure to do so may shorten the life of the components and result in malfunctions.

#### Make sure to set [HIGH ALTITUDE MODE] to [OFF] when using the projector at elevations lower than 1 400 m (4 593') above sea level.

Failure to do so may shorten the life of the components and result in malfunctions.

#### Do not install the projector at high altitudes of 2 700 m (8 858') or higher above sea level.


Doing so may shorten the life of the components and result in malfunctions.


#### ■ When installing and using the projector at an angle that exceeds 30° vertically, set [COOLING CONDITION] (→ page 77).

Failure to observe this may shorten the life of the components or result in malfunctions.

#### Do not use the projector with the connecting terminal side up.

Using the projector at an angle that exceeds the available angle of 210° may result in malfunctions. If setting up the projector at an angle that exceeds 210° is required, consult your dealer.





#### For the portrait setting, set the projector directly facing the screen.


• If the projector is vertically installed in the portrait setting, the keystone correction for the vertical tilt is not available. In this case, the keystone correction works for the horizontal tilt.

#### Cautions when setting up the projector

• To install and use the projector via a method that does not use the adjustable feet in a floor standing installation, fix the projector using the four screw holes for ceiling mounting (as shown in the figure).


(Screw diameter: M4, tapping depth inside the set: 10 mm (13/32"), torque:  $1.25 \pm 0.2 \text{ N} \cdot \text{m}$ ) Make a clearance of at least 12 mm (15/32") between the projector bottom and setting surface by inserting spacers (metallic) etc. between them.


• Use the adjustable feet only for the floor standing installation and for adjusting the angle. Using them for other purposes may damage the set.



#### The positions of screw holes for ceiling mount and adjustable feet

- Do not stack projectors on top of each other.
- Do not block the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.
- Prevent hot and cool air from the air conditioning system to blow directly to the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.





100 mm (4") or longer

• Do not install the projector in a confined space.

When it is necessary to install the projector in a confined space, install the air conditioning or ventilation separately. Exhaust heat may accumulate when the ventilation is not enough, triggering the protection circuit of the projector.

#### Security

When using this product, take safety measures against the following incidents.

- Personal information being leaked via this product
- Unauthorized operation of this product by a malicious third party
- Interfering or stopping of this product by a malicious third party
- Take sufficient security measures. (➡ pages 95, 113)
- Make your password difficult to guess as much as possible.

- Change your password periodically.
- Panasonic Corporation or its affiliate companies will never ask for your password directly. Do not divulge your password in case you receive such inquiries.
- The connecting network must be secured by a firewall, etc.
- · Set a password for the web control and restrict the users who can log in.

#### **DIGITAL LINK**

"DIGITAL LINK" is a technology that uses a twisted-pair-cable to transmit video, audio, Ethernet, and serial control signals. The projector supports the optional digital interface box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G), and the "XTP transmitter" of Extron Electronics. For twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with the DIGITAL LINK compatible projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

#### Disposal

To dispose of the product, ask your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal.

#### Cautions on use

#### To get a good picture quality

- In order to view a beautiful image in higher contrast, prepare an appropriate environment. Draw curtains or blinds over windows and turn off any lights near the screen to prevent outside light or light from indoor lamps from shining onto the screen.
- The high clarity projection lens is thermally affected by the light from the light source, making the focus unstable in the period just after switching on the power. The focus stabilizes when an image is projected continuously for 30 minutes or more.

#### Do not touch the surface of the projection lens with your bare hands.

If the surface of the projection lens becomes dirty from fingerprints or anything else, this will be magnified and projected onto the screen.

#### DLP chips

- The DLP chips are precision-made. Note that in rare cases, pixels of high precision could be missing or always lit. Note that such phenomena does not indicate malfunction.
- Directing a high-power laser beam onto the lens surface can damage the DLP chips.

#### Light source

The light source of the projector uses LED and lasers, and has the following characteristics.

- The luminance of the light source will decrease by duration of usage.
- The usage time until when the luminance of the light source decreases by half is approximately 20 000 hours. 20 000 hours is the estimated duration, and it varies depending on individual differences and usage conditions.

If the light source goes off or the brightness reduces noticeably, ask your dealer about replacement of the light source unit.

#### Computer and external device connections

- When connecting a computer or an external device, use power cords and shielded cables following instructions in this manual.
- When inputting digital signals to the DVI-I terminal, use a commercially available cable with a ferrite core.


#### Viewing 3D images

The projector can display 3D image signals that are input through various systems such as "frame packing" and "side by side". You need to prepare external devices for viewing 3D images (such as 3D eyewear, video signal output devices) which are compatible with your 3D system. For connections of the projector and external devices, see the instruction manuals of external devices you use. Connections vary depending on your 3D system.

Refer to "List of 3D compatible signals" (+ page 132) for the types of 3D video signals that can be used with the projector.

#### Accessories

Make sure that the following accessories are provided with your projector. Numbers enclosed in < > show the number of accessories.



#### Attention

- After unpacking the projector, discard the power cord cap and packaging material properly.
- Do not use other power cords other than the supplied power cord.
- For missing accessories, consult your dealer.
- Store small parts in an appropriate manner, and keep them away from small children.


- The remote control can be used within a distance of about 15 m (49'2") if pointed directly at the remote control receiver. The remote control can control at angles of up to ± 15° vertically and ± 30° horizontally, but the effective control range may be reduced.
- If there are any obstacles between the remote control and the remote control signal receiver, the remote control may not operate properly.
   The signal will be affected off the answer between the remote control signal receiver, the remote control may not operate properly.
- The signal will be reflected off the screen. However, the operating range may be limited from light reflection loss due to the screen material.
  If the remote control signal receiver directly receives strong light, such as fluorescent light, the remote control may not operate properly. Use it in a place distant from the light source.







### Using the remote control

#### Inserting and removing the batteries



1) Open the cover. (Fig. 1)

#### 2) Insert the batteries and close the cover (insert the 🖨 side first). (Fig. 2)

• When removing the batteries, perform the steps in reverse order.

#### Setting the remote control ID numbers

When you use the system with multiple projectors, you can operate all the projectors simultaneously or each projector individually using single remote control, if a unique ID number is assigned to each projector.

After setting the ID number of the projector, set same ID number on the remote control.

The factory default ID number of the projector is set to [ALL]. When using a single projector, press the <ID ALL> button on the remote control. Also, you can control a projector by pressing the <ID ALL> button on the remote control even if you do not know the projector ID.

#### How to set

- 1) Press the <ID SET> button on the remote control.
- Within five seconds, press the one-digit ID number set on the projector using the number (<1> <6>) buttons.

• If you press the <ID ALL> button, you can control the projectors regardless of the ID number setting of the projector.

#### Attention

- Since the ID number of the remote control can be set without the projector, do not press the <ID SET> button carelessly. If the <ID SET> button is pressed and no number (<1> <6>) buttons are pressed within five seconds, the ID number returns to its original value before the <ID SET> button was pressed.
- The ID number set on the remote control will be stored unless it is set again. However, it will be erased if the remote control is left with dead batteries. Set the same ID number again when the batteries are replaced.

#### Note

• Set the ID number of the projector from the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [PROJECTOR ID].


# Chapter 2 Getting Started

This chapter describes things you need to do before using the projector such as the setup and connections.

### Setting up

#### [PROJECTION METHOD] and [COOLING CONDITION]

There are six ways to set up the projector. Set the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [PROJECTION METHOD] and [COOLING CONDITION] depending on the environment. Also set [COOLING CONDITION] correctly. Using with incorrect settings may shorten the life of light source.



#### Adjusting adjustable feet

Install the projector on a flat surface so that the front of the projector is parallel to the screen surface and the projection screen is rectangular. If the screen is tilted downward, the projection screen can be adjusted to be rectangular by adjusting the adjustable feet. The adjustable feet can also be used to adjust the projector to be level when it is tilted in a horizontal direction.

Extend the adjustable feet by rotating in the direction shown in the figure and retract by rotating in the opposite direction.



Adjustable amount Front adjustable feet: Approx. 12 mm (15/32")

#### Attention

Be careful not to block the intake/exhaust with your hands or any objects when adjusting the adjustable feet when the light source is on.



### Connecting

#### Before connecting

- · Before connecting, carefully read the operating instructions for the external device to be connected.
- Turn off the power of all devices before connecting cables.
- Take note of the following points before connecting the cables. Failure to do so may result in malfunctions.
- When connecting a cable to a device connected to the projector or the projector itself, touch any nearby metallic objects to eliminate static electricity from your body before performing work.
- Do not use unnecessarily long cables to connect to a device connected to the projector or to the projector body. The longer the cable, the more it is susceptible to noise. Since using a cable while it is wound makes it act like an antenna, it is more susceptible to noise.
- When connecting cables, connect GND first, then insert the connecting terminal of the connecting device in a straight manner.
- Acquire any connection cable necessary to connect the external device to the system that is either not supplied with the device or not available as an option.
- Video signals containing too much jitter may cause the images on the screen to randomly wobble or wafture. In this case, a time base corrector (TBC) must be connected.
- The projector accepts video signals, analog RGB signals (synchronous signals are TTL level), and digital signals.
- Some computer models are not compatible with the projector.
- Use a cable compensator when you connect devices to the projector using long cables. Otherwise the image may not display properly.
- Refer to "List of compatible signals" (+ page 130) for the types of video signals that can be used with the projector.




#### Attention

- Always use one of the following when connecting a VCR.
  - A VCR with built-in time base corrector (TBC)
  - A time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the VCR
- If nonstandard burst signals are connected, the image may be distorted. In such case, connect the time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the external devices.
- When inputting digital signals to the DVI-I terminal, use a commercially available cable with a ferrite core.

#### Note

- When a DVI digital signal is input, some external devices to be connected may require to switch the setting using the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [DVI-I IN] → [EDID].
- The <DVI-I IN> terminal can be connected to HDMI- or DVI-I-compliant devices. However, images may not appear or may not be displayed properly on some devices.
- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- The <HDMI IN> terminal of the projector can be connected to an external device with a DVI terminal by using an HDMI/DVI conversion cable, but some devices may not project the image properly or function properly.
- The projector does not support VIERA Link (HDMI).
- If the [HDMI] and [DIGITAL LINK] settings in the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [AUDIO SETTING] → [AUDIO IN SELECT] are incorrect, the projector may have malfunctions such as the absence of audio.



- When inputting digital signals to the DVI-I terminal, use a commercially available cable with a ferrite core.




- When a DVI digital signal is input, some external devices to be connected may require to switch the setting using the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [DVI-I IN] → [EDID].
- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- The <HDMI IN> terminal of the projector can be connected to an external device with an DVI terminal by using a HDMI/DVI conversion cable, but some devices may not project the image properly or function properly.
- The <DVI-I IN> terminal (for digital input) supports single link only.
- Refer to "List of compatible signals" (+ page 130) for the types of video signals that can be used with the projector.
- If you operate the projector using the computer with the resume feature (last memory), you may have to reset the resume feature to operate the projector.
- If the [AUDIO IN SELECT] settings are incorrect, the projector may have malfunctions such as the absence of audio.

#### Connecting example: Twisted-pair-cable transmitter

Twisted-pair-cable transmitters such as the optional digital interface box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G) use twisted-pair-cables to transmit input video, audio, Ethernet, and serial signals, and the projector can input those digital signals to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal.



- If nonstandard burst signals are connected, the image may be distorted. In such case, connect the time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the external devices.
- Use a commercial HDMI/DVI conversion cable with a ferrite core.
- Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring for a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector. Image and sound may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.
- For the LAN cable between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, use a cable that meets the following criteria:
  - Compatible with CAT5e or higher
  - Shielded type (including connectors)
  - Straight-through
- Single wire
- When laying cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, check that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When using a relay connector midway, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
  When connecting to the projector using a twisted-pair-cable transmitter (receiver) of other manufacturer, do not place another twisted-pair-cable transmitter (receiver) between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturer and the projector. This may cause sound and image to be disrupted.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- Lay the cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When installing multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cables, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green (indicates normal quality). (⇒ page 99)

#### Note

- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- The projector does not support VIERA Link (HDMI).
- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). If this distance is
  exceeded, image and sound may be disrupted and may cause a malfunction in LAN communication. Please note that we do not support
  the use of the projector outside the maximum transmission distance.
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with the DIGITAL LINK compatible
  projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers
  has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance
  problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

#### Connecting example: IR transmitter

#### VESA standard 3D eyewear



#### Note

- When viewing 3D images using VESA standard 3D eyewear, connect the commercially available VESA standard IR transmitter and set the [3D SETTINGS] menu → [3D MODE] to [3D SYNC] or [DLP Link + 3D SYNC].
- When using 3D eyewear that supports DLP Link, an IR transmitter is not required.
   When using 3D eyewear that supports DLP Link, set the [3D SETTINGS] menu → [3D MODE] to [DLP Link] or [DLP Link + 3D SYNC].

# Chapter 3 Basic Operations


This chapter describes basic operations to start with.

### Switching on/off the projector

#### Connecting the power cord

**Make sure that the supplied power cord is securely fixed to the projector body to prevent it from being removed easily.** Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch is on the <OFF> side before connecting the power cord. For details of power cord handling, refer to "Read this first!" ( ) page 2).

#### Attaching the power cord



 Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal on the side of the projector body and the power cord connector and insert the plug completely in the correct direction (until you hear the hooks click in place).


#### Removing the power cord



- 1) Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch on the side of the projector body is on the <OFF> side, and remove the power plug from the outlet.
- 2) Remove the power cord connector from the <AC IN> terminal of the projector body while pressing the side tabs.

#### **Power indicator**

Displays the status of the power. Check the <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> status of the power indicator before operating the projector. When the light source indicator <LIGHT> and the temperature indicator <TEMP> are on or flashing, a problem may have occurred inside the projector. Check the status of the indicator before turning on the projector, and take appropriate steps. ( $\Rightarrow$  page 119)





#### Note

- The projector consumes power even in standby mode (the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights/flashes in red). Refer to "Power consumption" (> page 133) for the power consumption.
- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> flashes in green if a remote control signal is received.
- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> flashes in green slowly when the projector is in AV mute mode.

#### Switching on the projector



- 1) Connect the power cord to the projector body.
- 2) Connect the power plug to an outlet.
  - (AC 100 V 240 V 50 Hz/60 Hz)
- 3) Press the <ON> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn on the power.
   The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights/flashes in red, and the projector enters the standby mode.

#### 4) Press the power < 0/| > button.

• The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in green and the image is soon projected on the screen.

#### Note


 If the projector is switched on at around 0 °C (32 °F), a warm-up period of approximately five minutes may be necessary until an image is displayed.

The temperature indicator <TEMP> lights during the warm-up period. When the warm-up is completed, the temperature indicator <TEMP> turns off and the projection starts. Refer to "When an indicator lights up" (+ page 119) for the indicator status.

- If the operating environment temperature is low and warm-up takes more than five minutes, the projector will judge that a problem has
  occurred and the power will automatically be set to standby mode. If this happens, increase the operating environment temperature to 0 °C
  (32 °F) or higher, turn off the main power, and then turn on the power again.
- If the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], it may take more time before the
  projector starts projecting after the power is turned on compared with when [NORMAL] is set.
- When the power is turned or an input signal is switched, you may here a high-frequency driving sound. This is not a malfunction.
- If the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIAL STARTUP] is set to [LAST MEMORY] and the power is turned off by pressing the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch or by using the breaker directly while projecting during the last time of use, the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in green and projection starts after a while when the power is turned on by pressing the <ON> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch with the power plug connected to the outlet, or with the breaker turned on.


#### Making adjustments and selections

It is recommended that images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.



- 1) Set the initial settings. (⇒ page 20)
  - The initial setting screen is displayed when the projector is switched on for the first time after purchase as well as when [ALL USER DATA] in the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIALIZE] is executed.
- 2) Press the input selection (<COMPUTER>, <DVI-I>, <VIDEO>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <HDMI>) buttons to select the input signal.
- 3) Adjust the front, back and sideway tilt of the projector with the adjustable feet. ( page 28)
- 4) If the input signal is an RGB signal, press the <AUTO SETUP> button.

#### Switching off the projector



- 1) Press the power  $\langle 0/| >$  button.
  - The [POWER OFF(STANDBY)] confirmation screen is displayed.
- 2) Press ◀▶ to select [OK], and press the <ENTER> button.
  (Or press the power <⑴/ |> button again.)
  Projection of the image stops.
- Wait for a few seconds until the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> of the projector body lights/ flashes in red.
- 4) Press the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn off the power.

Note

- Even when the power <0/|> button is pressed and the power is switched off, the projector consumes power if the main power of the projector is on.
- When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], the power consumption during standby can be conserved.
  The power can be turned off by pressing the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch while projecting or by directly using the breaker under conditions where the <MAIN POWER> switch of the projector cannot be switched off/on easily such as while mounting on the ceiling. However, the settings or adjustments performed right before the power is turned off may not be reflected.

## Projecting

Check the external device connections ( page 29) and the power cord connection ( page 34), and turn on the projector ( page 35) to start projecting. Select the video for projection, and adjust appearance of the projected image.

### Selecting the input signal


Select an input signal.

- 1) Press the input selection (<COMPUTER>, <DVI-I>, <VIDEO>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <HDMI>) buttons on the remote control or the <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel.
  - The image of the signal being input in the selected terminal is projected.

### Attention

- Images may not be projected properly depending on the external device, or the blu-ray disc or DVD disc, to be played back. Set the [PICTURE] menu → [SYSTEM SELECTOR].
- Confirm the aspect ratio of the projection screen and the image, and switch to an optimum aspect ratio from the [POSITION] menu → [ASPECT].

### Adjusting the image



### 1) Adjust the projection angle.

- Install the projector on a flat surface and parallel to the screen so that the projected screen is rectangular.
- If the screen is tilted downward, extend the adjustable feet and adjust the projection screen so that the projected screen is rectangular.
- Refer to "Adjusting adjustable feet" (➡ page 28) for details.

### 2) Release the lens shift lever lock by turning it counter-clockwise.

#### 3) Adjust the lens shift. (Fig. 1)

- Adjust the projection position using the lens shift lever.
- Refer to "Adjustment range by the lens position shift (optical shift)" (+ page 39) for details.

### 4) Lock the lens shift lever by turning it clockwise.

### 5) Adjust the zoom and focus. (Fig. 2)

• Adjust by turning the zoom ring and focus ring.

#### Attention

• Note that your fingers may get caught between the lens and surrounding area when adjusting the zoom, depending on the position of the hand holding the zoom ring.

#### Note

- It is recommended that images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.
- Turning the focus ring changes the projection screen size. Make fine adjustments again to the projection screen size by turning the zoom ring.
- When there is trapezoidal distortion, execute the [POSITION] menu → [KEYSTONE].

### Viewing 3D images

To project/view 3D images, you need active shutter system 3D eyewear, 3D content, and devices that can play 3D content. The projector only supports frame packing system, side by side system, top and bottom system, and frame sequential system as 3D video signal input. Other systems are not supported.

The active shutter system 3D eyewear supports DLP Link system and VESA standard IR (Infrared) system. However, not all the 3D eyewear operations have been verified.

#### Attention

- Be sure to read "VIEWING 3D VIDEO" in "Read this first!" (→ page 8) before projecting/viewing 3D images.
- Also read the operating instructions of 3D eyewear when using 3D eyewear.
- If you use 3D eyewear in a room with the fluorescent light turned on, light may flicker or 3D images may not be viewed properly. In such a case, turn off the fluorescent light.
- Take off 3D eyewear before viewing displays other than 3D images (such as computer screen, digital clock, calculator).

### 3D eyewear with DLP Link system support

You can project/view 3D images using 3D eyewear that supports DLP Link through the following procedure. Turn on the projector.

### 1) Turn on the 3D eyewear.

### 2) Change projector settings to use the 3D eyewear.

• To set, select [DLP Link] or [DLP Link + 3D SYNC] in the [3D SETTINGS] menu  $\rightarrow$  [3D MODE].

### Note

- Change the setting in the [3D SETTINGS] menu  $\rightarrow$  [LEFT/RIGHT SWAP]  $\rightarrow$  [DLP Link], if there is something wrong with 3D images.
- The 3D eyewear that supports DLP Link operates by receiving synchronized signals of 3D images which are included in projection light reflected on the screen, and images can be viewed in three dimensions. Depending on the conditions such as projection screen size, brightness of installation location, viewing distance, and brightness of the light
- source, synchronized signals may not be received properly and you may not view 3D images correctly.
  To view 3D images using the 3D eyewear that supports DLP Link system, the 3D eyewear is required to be synchronized to the following frequency according to the vertical scanning frequency of 3D video signals. For 3D eyewear specifications, contact the companies of 3D eyewear.

Vertical scanning frequency	3D eyewear supporting frequency
60 Hz/120 Hz	120 Hz
50 Hz/100 Hz	100 Hz
24 Hz	96 Hz

### 3D eyewear with VESA standard IR (Infrared) system support

You can project/view 3D images using 3D eyewear that supports VESA standard IR (Infrared) system through the following procedure. Turn off the projector.

1) Connect the IR transmitter cable to the <3D SYNC> terminal on the projector.

#### 2) Turn on the projector, 3D eyewear, and IR transmitter.

### 3) Change projector settings to use the 3D eyewear.

• To set, select [3D SYNC] or [DLP Link + 3D SYNC] in the [3D SETTINGS] menu → [3D MODE].


#### Note

• Change the setting in the [3D SETTINGS] menu → [LEFT/RIGHT SWAP] → [3D SYNC], if there is something wrong with 3D images.

### Adjustment range by the lens position shift (optical shift)

Perform the lens position shift within the adjustment range.

The focus may change when the lens position is shifted out of the adjustment range. This is because the movement of the lens is restricted to protect the optical parts. Projection position can be adjusted with the optical axis shift based on the standard projection position in the range shown in the following figures.




\* The numerical values in the preceding diagrams represent a case in which the projector is set on a desk/floor.

### Note

• The best screen can be achieved by installing the projector in front of the screen and adjusting the lens shift lever towards the center.

## **Operating with the remote control**



### Using the AV mute function

If the projector is not used for a certain period of time during the meeting intermission, for example, it is possible to turn off the audio and video temporarily.

## AV MUTE



### 1) Press the <AV MUTE> button.

- The audio and video turn off.
- 2) Press the <AV MUTE> button again.
  - The audio and video turn on.

### Note

- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> flashes slowly when the projector is in AV mute mode.
- The projector has no built-in speakers. Audio is output from the external sound system connected to the <VARIABLE AUDIO OUT> terminal.

### **Using the Freeze function**

The projected image can be paused temporarily and the audio muted, regardless of the playback of the external equipment.

### FREEZE

\_\_\_ button

- 1) Press the <FREEZE> button.
  - The video is paused and the audio is muted.

### 2) Press the <FREEZE> button again.


• The video playback resumes and the audio is unmuted.

### Note

<sup>• [</sup>FREEZE] is displayed on the screen when the video is paused.

### Switching the input

The input for projection can be switched.



### 1) Press the input selection (<COMPUTER>, <DVI-I>, <VIDEO>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <HDMI>) buttons.

• This operation can be also performed using the <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel.

<computer></computer>	Switch the input to COMPUTER.
<dvi-i></dvi-i>	Switch the input to DVI-I.
<video></video>	Switch the input to VIDEO.
<digital link=""></digital>	Switch the input to DIGITAL LINK.
<hdmi></hdmi>	Switch the input to HDMI.

#### Note

 When the optional digital interface box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G) is connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal, the ET-YFB100G input changes with each press of the <DIGITAL LINK> button.

For twisted-pair-cable transmitters of other manufacturers, switch the input on the projector to DIGITAL LINK, and then switch the input on the twisted-pair-cable transmitter.

### Using the Automatic setup function

The automatic setup function can be used to automatically adjust the resolution, clock phase, and image position when analog RGB signals consisting of bitmap images such as computer signals are being input, or to automatically adjust the image position when DVI-D/HDMI signals are input. Supplying images with bright white borders at the edges and high-contrast black and white characters is recommended when the system is in automatic adjustment mode.

Avoid supplying images that include halftones or gradation, such as photographs and computer graphics.



### 1) Press the <AUTO SETUP> button.

• [COMPLETE] is displayed when it has completed without any problem.

### Note

- The clock phase may shift even if it has completed without any incident. In such cases, adjust the [POSITION] menu → [CLOCK PHASE]
   (⇒ page 56).
- If an image with blurred edges or a dark image is input, [INCOMPLETE] may appear or adjustment may not be performed properly even when [COMPLETE] appears. In this case, adjust the settings in the [ADVANCED MENU] menu → [INPUT RESOLUTION] (→ page 59), [POSITION] → [CLOCK PHASE] (→ page 56), and [SHIFT] (→ page 54).
- Adjust special signals according to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [AUTO SETUP] (→ page 69).
- · Automatic adjustment may not work depending on the model of the computer.
- Automatic adjustment may not work for a synchronization signal of C-SY or SYNC ON GREEN.
- Images may be disrupted for a few seconds during automatic adjustment, but it is not a malfunction.
- Adjustment is required for each input signal.
- Automatic adjustment can be canceled by pressing the <RETURN> or <MENU> button during the automatic adjustment operation.
- If the automatic setup function is used while moving images are being input, the adjustment may not be performed properly even for an RGB signal that can use automatic setup. [INCOMPLETE] may appear, or adjustment may not be finished properly even if [COMPLETE] appears.

### Using the Function button

Frequently used operations can be assigned to the buttons from <FUNC1> to <FUNC3> on the remote control to be used as simple shortcut buttons.



1) Press the <FUNC1> to <FUNC3> buttons.

### When assigning operations to the buttons from <FUNC1> to <FUNC3>

1) Press the <MENU> on the control panel or the remote control to display the menu items (main menu, sub-menu, or details menu) you want to assign.

• Refer to "Navigating through the menu" (> page 44) for the operation of the on-screen menu.

### 2) Press and hold any buttons from <FUNC1> to <FUNC3> for three seconds or more.

### Note

- After settings have been completed, F1, F2, or F3 is displayed on the left of the assigned menu item (main menu, sub-menu, or details menu) when <FUNC1>, <FUNC2>, or <FUNC3> is set, respectively.
- Perform the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [FUNCTION BUTTON] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 87) when deallocating functions.

### Using the ECO management function

The setting screen related to the ECO management can be displayed.



### 1) Press the <ECO> button on the remote control.

#### Note

Refer to the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] (→ page 77) for details.

### Adjusting the volume

The audio output volume can be adjusted.

### VOLUME

1) Press the <VOLUME+>/<VOLUME-> button on the remote control.

<volume+></volume+>	Increases the volume.





- Some items cannot be reset by pressing the <DEFAULT> button. Adjust each item manually.
- The square mark under the bar scale in the individual adjustment screen indicates the factory default setting. The position of the square mark varies by the selected input signals.

### Setting the on-screen display to show/hide

If you press the <MENU> button on the control panel or the remote control for at least three seconds, the on-screen display setup screen is displayed and the on-screen display can be set to show/hide.

If the [SECURITY] menu → [TEXT DISPLAY] is [ON], the on-screen setting screen cannot be displayed.





### [INPUT RESOLUTION]

Adjust to achieve an optimal image when there is a flickering image or smeared outlines.

### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [INPUT RESOLUTION].

### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [INPUT RESOLUTION] screen is displayed.

- 3) Press ▲▼ to select [TOTAL DOTS], [DISPLAY DOTS], [TOTAL LINES], or [DISPLAY LINES], and press
   ♦► to adjust it.
  - Values corresponding to the signal being input are displayed automatically for each item. Increase or decrease the displayed values and adjust to the optimal point viewing the screen when there are vertical stripes or sections are missing from the screen.





The optimal point of correction is set by adjusting [NON-OVERLAPPED BLACK LEVEL] so the black level of the overlapping image area will be the same level as the non-overlapping area. If the border area of the part where the image is overlapping and the non-overlapping part gets brighter after adjusting [NON-OVERLAPPED BLACK LEVEL], adjust the width of the top, bottom, left, or right. Adjust [BLACK BORDER LEVEL] when the width adjustment makes only the border area darker.
- The joining part may look discontinuous depending on the position you are looking from when a screen with high gain or rear screen is used.
  When configuring multiple screens using both horizontal and vertical edge blending, adjust [OVERLAPPED BLACK LEVEL] first before
- making adjustments in Step **12**). Adjustment method is same as the procedure of [NON-OVERLAPPED BLACK LEVEL].
- If only horizontal or vertical edge blending is used, set all items in [OVERLAPPED BLACK LEVEL] to 0.
- [AUTO TESTPATTERN] settings change together with the [AUTO TESTPATTERN] of [COLOR MATCHING].



- Closed captions are a function that is mainly used in North America to display text information with video signals. Captions may not be displayed depending on the connected devices or software being played back.
- [CLOSED CAPTION SETTING] can only be selected if an NTSC signal is input.
- If a closed caption signal of the selected mode is input, the security message and the ECO level (⇒ page 79) are not displayed even when the [SECURITY] menu → [TEXT DISPLAY] (⇒ page 96) is set to [ON].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[DEFAULT LOGO]	Displays the Panasonic logo.
[USER LOGO]	Displays the image registered by the user.
[NONE]	Disables the startup logo display.

- The startup logo will disappear in approximately 15 seconds.
- To create/register the [USER LOGO] image, use "Logo Transfer Software" included in the supplied CD-ROM.

# [SUB MEMORY LIST]

The projector has a sub memory function that can register the multiple image adjustment data, even if it is recognized as the same signal by the frequency or format of the synchronization signal source.

Use this function when you need to adjust the image quality such as switching of the aspect ratio or white balance by the same synchronization signal source. The sub memory includes all the data that can be adjusted for each signal, such as the screen aspect ratio and data adjusted in the [PICTURE] menu ([CONTRAST], [BRIGHTNESS], etc.).

#### Registering the current settings to the list

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [SUB MEMORY LIST], and press the <ENTER> button.

- The sub memory registration screen is displayed if the sub memory is not registered. Proceed to Step 3).
- · A list of sub memories registered to the signal currently input is displayed.
- [SUB MEMORY LIST] can be displayed by pressing  $\blacktriangleleft$  on the normal screen (when the menu is not displayed).

#### 2) Press ▲▼◀▶ to select the sub memory number to register in [SUB MEMORY LIST].

#### 3) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [RENAME] screen is displayed.

#### 4) Press the <ENTER> button.

• To rename the registered signal, follow the procedure in Steps 4) and 5) in "Renaming the registered signal" (> page 93).

## Switching to the sub memory list

• The selected sub memory will be deleted.

# [FREEZE]

The projected image is paused temporarily and the sound stopped regardless of the playback of the external equipment.

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [FREEZE].

  - Press the <RETURN> button to release.

#### Note

• [FREEZE] is displayed on the screen when video is paused.

# [AV MUTE]

Turn off audio and video when the projector is not used for a certain period of time.

## 1) Press ▲▼ to select [AV MUTE].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• Press the <RETURN> button to release.

#### Note

• The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> flashes slowly when the projector is in AV mute mode.

# [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu

# [PROJECTOR ID]

The projector has an ID number setting function that can be used when multiple projectors are used side by side to enable simultaneous control or individual control via one remote control.

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [PROJECTOR ID].

## 2) Press **♦** to switch [PROJECTOR ID].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[ALL]	Sets when controlling without specifying an ID number.
[1] - [6]	Sets when specifying and controlling an individual ID number.

#### Note

- The ID number can be set to [ALL], or from [1] to [6].
- To specify an ID number for individual control, the ID number of a remote control must match the ID number of the projector.
- When the ID number is set to [ALL], the projector will operate regardless of the ID number specified during remote control or computer control.

If multiple projectors are set up side by side with IDs set to [ALL], they cannot be controlled separately from the projectors with other ID numbers.

• Refer to "Setting the remote control ID numbers" (+ page 24) for how to set the ID number on the remote control.

# [PROJECTION METHOD]

Set the projection method in accordance with the installation status of the projector. Change the projection method if the screen display is upside down or inverted.

## 1) Press ▲▼ to select [PROJECTION METHOD].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [PROJECTION METHOD] screen is displayed.

#### 3) Press $\blacktriangle \lor$ to select the projection method.

[FRONT/FLOOR]	When installing on the desk, etc., in front of the screen
[FRONT/CEILING]	When installing using the ceiling mount bracket (optional accessories) in front of the screen
[REAR/FLOOR]	When installing on the desk, etc., behind the screen (using a translucent screen)
[REAR/CEILING]	When installing using the ceiling mount bracket (optional accessories) behind the screen (using a translucent screen)

### 4) Press the <ENTER> button.

#### 5) When the confirmation is displayed, select [OK] or [CANCEL], and press the <ENTER> button.


#### Attention

When [PROJECTION METHOD] is changed, confirm that [COOLING CONDITION] (
 page 77) is set correctly.

# [COOLING CONDITION]

Change the fan control depending on the direction of projection.

Set [COOLING CONDITION] correctly in accordance with the direction of projection referencing the following figure. Using the light source with incorrect settings may shorten its life.



- 1) Press ▲▼ to select [COOLING CONDITION].
- 2) Press the <ENTER> button.
   The [COOLING CONDITION] screen is displayed.
- 3) Press  $\blacktriangle \lor$  to select a cooling condition.
- 4) Press the <ENTER> button.
- 5) When the confirmation is displayed, select [OK] or [CANCEL], and press the <ENTER> button.

# [HIGH ALTITUDE MODE]

Set to [ON] when using the projector at high altitudes between 1 400 m (4 593') and 2 700 m (8 858') above sea level.

- 1) Press ▲▼ to select [HIGH ALTITUDE MODE].
- 2) Press **♦** to switch the item.

[OFF]	When using at a location lower than 1 400 m (4 593') above sea level
[ON]	When using at high altitudes (between 1 400 m (4 593') and 2 700 m (8 858') above sea level)

3) When the confirmation screen is displayed, press ◀▶ to select [OK] or [CANCEL], and press the <ENTER> button.

#### Note

• The speed of the fan increases and the operation sound becomes louder when set to [ON].

## [ECO MANAGEMENT]

A function that optimizes the light source power to suit usage conditions to reduce power consumption.

## Setting [LIGHT POWER]

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [ECO MANAGEMENT].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [ECO MANAGEMENT] screen is displayed.

#### 3) Press ▲▼ to select [LIGHT POWER].

#### 4) Press **♦** to switch [LIGHT POWER].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[NORMAL]	Sets when high luminance is required.
[ECO SAVE1]	Reduces the power by approximately 20 % in average compared to [NORMAL] without affecting the brightness.

## Chapter 4 Settings — [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu

[ECO SAVE2]	Reduces the power by approximately 30 % in average compared to [NORMAL], minimizing reduction in brightness.
[LOW]	Sets this when you want to save more power without the need for high brightness.

#### Note

- The rate of power consumption reduction when the eco save mode is set refers to the ratio of average power consumption when a "Broadcast" video signal that complies with IEC62087 is projected.
- When [ECO SAVE1] and [ECO SAVE2] is set, the image may appear differently to [NORMAL].
- If you feel that the brightness has decreased with [ECO SAVE2], switching to [ECO SAVE1] may improve the image.
- When [LOW] is set, the operating noise can be reduced.
- When the VIDEO input is selected, [ECO SAVE1] and [ECO SAVE2] cannot be selected. When [ECO SAVE1] or [ECO SAVE2] is set while selecting other than VIDEO input, and when the VIDEO input is selected, [LOW] is set.
- When [NATURAL] is selected in [PICTURE MODE], and [ECO SAVE1] or [ECO SAVE2] is selected in [LIGHT POWER], the image may not
  conform to sRGB standards.
- When [REC709] is selected in [PICTURE MODE], and [ECO SAVE1] or [ECO SAVE2] is selected in [LIGHT POWER], the image may not conform to Rec.709 standards.
- When [DICOM SIM.] is selected in [PICTURE MODE], and [ECO SAVE1] or [ECO SAVE2] is selected in [LIGHT POWER], the image may
  appear different from the image of DICOM standards.
- Cannot be selected when viewing 3D videos. This is fixed to [NORMAL].

# Setting [AUTO POWER SAVE]

Set whether to enable the three functions [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION], [SIGNAL DETECTION], and [AV MUTE DETECTION].

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [ECO MANAGEMENT].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [ECO MANAGEMENT] screen is displayed.

#### 3) Press ▲▼ to select [AUTO POWER SAVE].

#### 4) Press **♦** to switch [AUTO POWER SAVE].

The items will switch each time you press the button.

[ON]	Enables power-saving mode.
[OFF]	Disables power-saving mode.

# 5) Press ▲▼ to select [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION], [SIGNAL DETECTION], or [AV MUTE DETECTION].

[AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION]	Adjusts the light source power depending on the brightness of the location of the projector.
[SIGNAL DETECTION]	Reduces the power of the light source when there is no signal.
[AV MUTE DETECTION]	Reduces the power of the light source in AV mute mode.

# 6) Press **♦** to switch the setting of [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION], [SIGNAL DETECTION], or [AV MUTE DETECTION].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[ON]	Enables the setting.
[OFF]	Disables the setting.

#### Note

 When [AUTO POWER SAVE] is [OFF], [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION], [SIGNAL DETECTION], and [AV MUTE DETECTION] cannot be set.

• [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION] cannot be selected when viewing 3D videos. This is fixed to [OFF].

## Setting [NO SIGNAL SHUT-OFF]

A function that automatically switches the power source of the projector to standby if there is no input signal for a certain period of time. The time before switching to standby can be set.

## 1) Press ▲▼ to select [ECO MANAGEMENT].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [ECO MANAGEMENT] screen is displayed.

## 3) Press ▲▼ to select [NO SIGNAL SHUT-OFF].

## 4) Press **♦** to switch [NO SIGNAL SHUT-OFF].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[DISABLE]	Disables the No signal shut-off function.
[10MIN.] - [90MIN.]	Sets the time in 10-minute intervals.

## Setting [STANDBY MODE]

Set the power consumption during the standby.

1) Press ▲▼ to select [ECO MANAGEMENT].

# 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [ECO MANAGEMENT] screen is displayed.

#### 3) Press ▲▼ to select [STANDBY MODE].

#### 4) Press **♦** to switch [STANDBY MODE].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[ECO]	Use this setting to reduce power consumption during standby.
[NORMAL] Use this setting to use the network function during standby.	

#### Note

- When set to [ECO], network functions are not available during standby. Also, some RS-232C commands are not available. When set to [NORMAL], network functions are available during standby.
- If set to [ECO], there may be a delay in displaying when the power is turned on compared to when set to [NORMAL].

## Setting [ECO LEVEL DISPLAY]

Display the amount of power saved through the [LIGHT POWER] and [AUTO POWER SAVE] settings on the lower left corner of the projected screen.

The more the number of green leaf marks (  $\mathcal{D}$  ) the more power the projector saves. Screen display example:



## Press ▲▼ to select [ECO MANAGEMENT].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [ECO MANAGEMENT] screen is displayed.

## 3) Press ▲▼ to select [ECO LEVEL DISPLAY].

#### 4) Press **♦** to switch [ECO LEVEL DISPLAY].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[OFF]	Disables the ECO level display.
[ON]	Enables the ECO level display.

#### Note

• If a closed caption signal of the selected mode is input, ECO level is not displayed.

• The ECO level is not displayed when the menu screen is displayed.

# [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL]

The projector has a built-in brightness sensor which measures the brightness of the light source and has a function which corrects the brightness of the screen according to the change in the brightness of the light source.

The light source deteriorates over time. By using this function, you can reduce the change in overall brightness or keep it uniform by suppressing the variation in brightness when displaying multiple screens using multiple projectors.

#### Note

If [DYNAMIC] is selected in the [PICTURE] menu → [PICTURE MODE], [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL] cannot be selected.

## Setting [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN]

Adjust the brightness when displaying multiple screens using multiple projectors.

## 1) Press ▲▼ to select [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL] screen is displayed.

### 3) Press ▲▼ to select [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN].

#### 4) Press **♦** to adjust.

	Adjustment		
Operation	Brightness	Maximum amount of brightness correction	Range of adjustment
Press the button.	The screen becomes brighter.	The maximum amount of correction is reduced.	20, 400 %

#### Note

- When using only one projector, the value obtained by subtracting the value of the [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] from 100 % is the maximum amount of brightness correction. Brightness cannot be corrected through brightness control since the maximum amount of correction becomes 0 % when [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] is at 100 %.
- Brightness is not stable for 15 minutes after the light source lights up. Make adjustments at least 15 minutes after starting projection.
- The result of [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] adjustments is reflected on all image signals, internal test patterns, and on-screen menus.
- The [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] setting is enabled even if [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL SETUP] is [OFF].

## Setting [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL SETUP]

Set brightness control operation.

#### 1) Press ▲▼ to select [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL].

#### 2) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL] screen is displayed.

#### 3) Press ▲▼ to select [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL SETUP].

#### 4) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL SETUP] screen is displayed.

#### 5) Press ▲▼ to select [MODE].

#### 6) Press **♦** to switch [MODE].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

[OFF]	Does not correct the brightness of the screen by the brightness sensor.
[AUTO]	Corrects the brightness of the screen by the brightness sensor. When the brightness of the light source changes, the brightness of the screen is automatically corrected.
[PC]	Synchronizes nine or more projectors through a computer using the dedicated software "Multi Projector Monitoring & Control Software" <sup>1</sup> .

\*1 "Multi Projector Monitoring & Control Software" is included in the supplied CD-ROM.

• When [AUTO] is selected, proceed to Step 7).

#### 7) Press $\blacktriangle \lor$ to select [LINK].

#### 8) Press **♦** to switch [LINK].

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

	Performs corrections by the brightness sensor in one projector without synchronizing with the other projectors.
[OFF]	The period, in which the constant brightness kept by the small value of [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN], is prolonged.

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#### Chapter 4 Settings — [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu

Synchronizes corrections in multiple projectors by the brightness sensor. You can set up to four groups (A to D) within the same subnet by using the network function. You can also register and synchronize up to eight projectors in one group.

  not set, correction will not be performed automatically.
- The brightness control and the ECO management operate simultaneously. However, [LIGHT POWER] in [ECO MANAGEMENT] is fixed to [NORMAL] while the brightness is measured. Also, [AUTO POWER SAVE] is fixed to [OFF].
- The set changes in the [CALIBRATION TIME] will be reflected during the time you entered.
- The set changes in the [CALIBRATION MESSAGE] will be reflected at the time items are switched using **4**.





- 11) Adjust [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] in each projector.
  - Adjust [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] of all the other projectors so that the brightness is matched to the projector of which [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL GAIN] is set to 90 %.
- 12) Set [MODE] of [BRIGHTNESS CONTROL SETUP] to [AUTO], and [LINK] to [GROUP A] in all projectors.





# Connecting to a twisted-pair-cable transmitter

The projector has a function that can receive Ethernet signals from a twisted-pair-cable transmitter together with video and audio signals via a LAN cable.

Connect a LAN cable to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal of the projector. (+ pages 18, 23)

#### Example of network connections via a twisted-pair-cable transmitter



- For the LAN cable between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, use a cable that meets the following criteria:
  - Compatible with CAT5e or higher
  - Shielded type (including connectors)
  - Straight-through
  - Single wire
- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). If this distance is exceeded, image and sound may be disrupted and may cause a malfunction in LAN communication.
- When laying cables, check that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When using a relay connector midway, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- Lay the cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When installing multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cables, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green (indicates normal quality). (⇒ page 99)
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with the DIGITAL LINK compatible projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.





- Access will be locked for few minutes when an incorrect password is entered three times consecutively.
- Some items on the projector setting page use the Javascript function of the web browser. The projector may not be able to be controlled properly if it is set with a browser that does not have this function enabled.




# Light source/temperature indicator

# When an indicator lights up

If a problem should occur inside the projector, the light source indicator <LIGHT>/temperature indicator <TEMP> will inform you by lighting or flashing. Check the status of the indicators and manage the indicated problems as follows.

### Attention

- When switching off the projector to deal with problems, make sure to follow the procedure in "Switching off the projector" (> page 36).
- Check the status of the power supply with the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)>. (+ page 34)

# Maintenance

### **Outer case**

Wipe off dirt and dust with a soft, dry cloth.

- If the dirt is persistent, soak the cloth with water and wring it thoroughly before wiping. Dry off the projector with a dry cloth.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or rubbing alcohol, other solvents, or household cleaners. Doing so may deteriorate the outer case.
- · When using chemically treated dust cloths, follow the instructions written on its packaging.

### Lens front surface

Wipe off dirt and dust from the front surface of the lens with a soft clean cloth.

- Do not use a cloth that is fluffy, dusty, or soaked with oil/water.
- Since the lens is fragile, do not use excessive force when wiping the lens.

### Attention

• The lens is made of glass. Impacts or excessive force when wiping may scratch its surface. Please handle with care.

### Cleaning inside the projector

Ask your dealer about cleaning inside the projector every 20 000 hours of usage as an estimated duration.

- If the projector is used in a dusty place, cleaning may be required before the usage time has reached 20 000 hours.
- If the light source goes off or the brightness reduces noticeably, ask your dealer about replacement of the light source unit.
